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Investigation of Wildlife in the Pilgrim Creek-Hermitage
Point Area, Grand Teton National Park, Wyoming
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The Pilgrim Creek-Hermitage Point investigation was carried on at irregular intervals in the summer of 1960 due to teaching responsibilities at the University of Wyoming Summer School. Photographs were taken of certain areas to record variations in use of the region by man and horses.

On August 25, 712 Canadian geese, Branta canadensis, were counted along the lake shore between the mouth of Pilgrim Creek and the mouth of Third Creek. This August 25 census was the highest count of geese recorded between August 23 and September 6. In 1959 the highest count of 636 geese was made on August 16.

In cooperation with personnel of Grand Teton National Park and the Wyoming Game and Fish Commission, experimental marking devices were constructed and placed in the field for assistance in elk migration and herd movement studies between the west shore of Jackson Lake and the National Elk Refuge.
